


Thank You for a Year That Was All I Could Imagine and So Much More!

Our Rotary Foundation at Work

2023-2024 Competitive & Collaborative Community Grant Awards Announced



Thanks to the generosity of our fellow Rotarians to the Rotary Foundation, we had enough DDF to award

more than the originally stated competitive grants.

This year we received a total of 67 grant requests with a total of \$148,250 in grant funds awarded. \$78,250 was awarded in the standard grant category, and another \$70,000 in competitive and collaborative grant awards. As always, no grant funds can be spent prior to the official approval from the Rotary Foundation – stay tuned for an announcement from the Community Grants Chair when the approval is received.

We have awarded our first ever Collaborative Grant – with **Peachtree City** in the lead role for a \$30,000 project focused on Fighting Disease. Partner clubs include **Barnesville, Lake Spivey/Clayton County, Tyrone, Fayetteville, Griffin, Griffin Daybreak and Newnan**.



The conference will be at the beautiful Jekyll Island Convention Center, and several hotels have room blocks reserved through February 21, 2024. Jekyll Island is booming, so you are encouraged to book your hotel room NOW! Once our room blocks are sold there is no guarantee that more room nights will be added.

When making your reservation, please be sure and reference Rotary District 6900. We have room blocks reserved with:

- The Westin Jekyll Island, which is within walking distance of the Convention Center
- The Courtyard by Marriott and The Residence Inn, which have a free island-wide shuttle
- Hampton Inn & Suites; Seafarer Inn & Suites; Holiday Inn Resort; and the Beachview Club Hotel.

There are other hotels on the island, as well as short-term rentals and camping opportunities, but as of right now only the hotels listed here are offering reduced rates for conference attendees. We will keep you posted if other hotels are added.

To register, login to rotary6900.org and click on "Register for the 2024 District Conference at Jekyll Island." The registration fee is \$275. There are also special rates for guests, students, and children under the age of 17. The registration fee will go up in September (\$295), so it pays to register early!

There is a new Cancellation Policy in place for the Registration Fee only. Hotel cancellations will be per the hotel policy. Any cancellation before November 1, 2023 will receive a full refund less \$25. Cancellations between November 1, 2023 and January 1, 2024 will receive a 75% refund. Cancellations between January 2, 2024 and March 1, 2024 will receive a 50% refund. Cancellations between March 2, 2024 and March 15, 2024 will receive a 25% refund. There will be no refunds after March 15, 2024.

DGE André is a Lady with a Song, and this conference will be filled with music, laughter, fun, and fellowship. Let's celebrate all the ways our clubs make Rotary BIGGER, BETTER, AND LOUDER! Alpharetta Rotary's Innovation Academy Interact Club departed on Saturday, June 3 for Pelotas, R.S., Brazil to continue District 6900's partnership with six clubs in District 4680. The two districts, along with clubs in New England D7780, have been partnering since 2021 to support a Down Syndrome training and service program slated to launch later this year. Pelotas-based APADPEL, the Association of Parents of Down Syndrome in Pelotas, is excited to host the service team. In addition to the groundbreaking teaching/training model, funds have also been raised for a service building. The Interact team, led by Alpharetta Rotarian Josh Jarvis, will meet and enjoy service time with the 40+ members of Interact Pelotas. Together, they plan to paint and assist with landscaping around the new building in addition to other adventures. The trip will be highlighted by a Friday evening celebration with the Rotary Club of Pelotas-Oeste.

"These Interact clubs may go on to partner with other projects", says Jarvis, "but this year they've decided to raise funds and continue the good work that's been accomplished with APADPEL".

In this third year of awarding the Rotary National Medal of Honor, the **Rotary Club of Americus** wishes to recognize four public service personnel for providing exemplary service to the citizens of the Americus and Sumter County community. We are honored to award these individuals who share a core value of the 1.4 million Rotary International members, worldwide, which is "Service Above Self."

On a week when we recognize the National Peace Officers Memorial Day and National Police Week, we are thrilled to honor our law enforcement officers as well as first responders with the Rotary "Service Above Self" National Medal of Honor. Hear the Georgia Ports Authority Story



At Georgia Ports Authority, deepwater terminals in Savannah and Brunswick ensure the continuous flow of goods to and from global destinations. These vital gateways move retail shipments, refrigerated cargo, cars and machinery, bulk, and breakbulk cargo.

The Georgia Ports Authority is coming off a two-year period of record container volumes. In 2022, the Port of Savannah handled nearly 5.9 million twenty-foot equivalent container units and achieved four of its top five months for container volume. To add capacity for new business, GPA has instituted an ambitious plan to expand its berths, container yards and auto processing facilities.

The statewide economic impact of Georgia's deepwater ports includes \$140 billion in annual sales by industries that rely on the ports, as well as \$33 billion in personal income each year. The Georgia Ports Authority directly employs more than 1,800 people, however port activity supports 560,000 full- and part-time jobs statewide.

The Georgia Ports Authority has a dynamic message of growth, statewide impact and plans for the future to share with community leaders across Georgia. Thomasville Stands in Support of GRSP



The **Rotary Club of Thomasville** continues to support the Georgia Rotary Student Program (GRSP) at the highest per capita level in District 6900. For the 13th year in a row, the club was honored with the Jake Cheatham Award at District Conference, recognizing the club as the number one club in per capita giving for clubs of its membership size. GRSP was founded by Thomasville Rotarian William A. Watt in 1947. Watt served in the military in Europe during World War II and saw the destruction war causes. He founded GRSP to help promote world peace by bringing college age students to Georgia to study in Georgia colleges and universities for one year.

Each year the club's Board of Directors sets the amount of GRSP funds; for 2022-23, club members met and exceeded the goal - raising a total of \$27,471. This brings our total GRSP giving since the 1987-1988 Rotary year to \$612,946.

This Rotary year, a total of 27 Club members and one honoree were recognized for reaching new or first levels for their giving to GRSP. Ten members were recognized in October an 18 more in May as follows: Teri White was recognized as a Hart Joiner Fellow, the first in the Club, and the first person in GRSP to receive the Hart Joiner Fellow recognition since fellow awards began to be presented. Rankin M. Smith, Jr. was recognized as a new Jake Cheatham Fellow. John A. Brown, Mary Beth Donalson, and Richard S. Vann were recognized as new Kendall Weisiger Fellows. Receiving Hue Thomas Fellow recognitions were Danny Braddy and Terry Rouse. Retta Rouse received the Hue Thomas Fellow recognition honoring her deceased husband, Terry Rouse.

Members Anna Lee and Charlene Parrish and GRSP host parent, Suzanne Dixon all received Will Watt Fellow recognitions. Charles and Suzanne Dixon served as host parents for the year for Thomasville Rotary Club's GRSP student scholar Julie Larson from Denmark. The Past President's Club honored Charles and Suzanne Dixon by making Suzanne a new Will Watt Fellow.
